PROGRAM OVERVIEW

As an offshoot and reconsideration of the thorough discussion and data presentation of the plight of the farmers of the province during their incumbency, the Dy-Albano Administration come up with a program which they call BRO- Bojie Rodito Opportunities a program directly given to the marginalized sectors of the society in order to alleviate their present situation on that time.

Initially, the conceived BRO Program was composed of 9 programs only and as years gone by, additional programs was incorporated to better serve the people. BRO Insurance was one of the initial programs.

This program geared towards ensuring the productivity, safety and well being of the Isabeliños with special attention to the small-farmers, their wives and children in the tertiary level, and providing indemnification during unfortunate events.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

BRO INSURANCE PROGRAM as one of the Social Protection Program of the Provincial Government of Isabela, was envisioned to help address the needs of the small-farmers in times of distress most especially when accidents and untimely demise of any member of the family occurs, so as not to resort to usurious lending institutions and/or financiers.

The Provincial Government of Isabela in its quest for an insured constituency, set aside amounts from its coffers to pay the amount of Fifty Pesos Only (Php 50.00) for the annual individual insurance coverage of the identified small farmers including their wives who are members of the Isabela Green Ladies Organization- (IGLO) and/or Rural Improvement Clubs – (RIC), the fisher-folks and the Provincial Scholars of the Province.

This is to guarantee the safety of every Isabeliño, and to enjoy the benefits of every insured member when accidents happen resulting to dismemberment, total disability and accidental deaths.

ACCOMPLISHMENT

The 2018 accomplishments highlighted the active participation and cooperation of the program implementers to the thrust of the BRO Farmers Assistance Office, operating in consolidation with other BRO Programs to include attending to Farmers Congresses, school visitations, meeting with officers and members of the Isabela Green Ladies Organization and fisherfolks all throughout the province, aside from attending to walk-in clients who frequented the office. As a result, the Office managed to enroll and the following number of persons per area, to wit:



TABLE 2. Monthly Distribution of Insured per Category for the Second Quarter.

















The table above (Table 9) shows the significant difference between the enrolled IGLO members to that of the Farmers, Fisherfolks and Scholars. The difference was attributed to the limited number of small farmers attending the Farmers Congresses considering their distance from the venue, selection and invitation by the Barangay Officials and time constraints.

While that of the Fisherfolks were the organized in different municipalities therefore the membership are intact.

There is also a gradual change on the number of students being insured for the past two (2) semesters. This has been the result of the implementation of the National Governments' New School Calendar which resulted to the change of enrollment dates and renewals respectively.

While that of the Women, the officers and members of the Isabela Green Ladies Organization or IGLO were all registered in their respective municipalities making it easier for them to mobilize and organized.

Table 10. Distribution of Claimed benefits for the Year 2018.





Table 10-A. Distribution of Actual Mount Claimed for the Year 2018.



Table 11. Distribution of Claimed benefits for Accidental Deaths.






Table 13. Distribution of Claimed benefits for Medical Reimbursements.

IMPACT

With the substantial increase of enrollees for the year 2018 in the Bro Insurance Program, significantly spell the awareness of the Isabelinos with the importance of safety and security. Noteworthy, is the appreciation of the Provincial Governments' Initiatives towards the alleviation of the plight of its constituency.

Enrolling in the Program was not just a mere getting of Insurance Cards, but the thought of inclusion in the parental care of the Province and enjoying the benefit of being an Isabelino.

Consequently, as we progress in number of enrollees, we are also creating a wider span of service to the Isabelino people and with that, a greater extent of individuals and peoples' organization are seeking to be incorporated with the Program.

SUSTAINABILITY

To guarantee the sustainability of this program, the Provincial Government of Isabela, enacted Ordinance No. 02, Series of 2012, "An Ordinance Institutionalizing the Bojie-Rodito Opportunities (BRO) for Agricuture Programs as well as the Provision of Funds for its Nine Components", and through the Office of the Provincial Governor, officially designated a permanent desk and personnel as his personal representative and liaison to, by and between the Insurance Company and the Farmers beneficiaries.

In addition, Sangguniang Panlalawigan Resolution No. 252, Series of 2015, was passed by the Local Legislative Council giving authority to the Governor to enter into Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Insurance Company, to that effect was forged.


