Clean-up Drive cum Information, Communication, and Education Campaign</p>		<p><b>January 30, 2024-</b> In observance of National Zero Waste Month, personnel from the Environment and Natural Resources Office, ISEP-TF Operatives and Job Orders led by Forester Geronimo P. Cabaccan, Jr., ENR Officer, alongside the DENR – EMB Region 02 headed by Ms. Jailaine R. Siriban, Chief, PEMU – Isabela, and PGI Utility Workers, conducted Information, Education, and Communication Campaign and clean-up drive activity, following the conclusion of the 2024 Bambanti Festival within the Provincial Capitol premises. The activity underscored the significance of effective, efficient, and sustainable waste management for the well-being of Filipinos. Throughout the weeklong festival celebration, there was a remarkable volume of mixed wastes generated due to influx of visitors coming from different places.</p> <p>Approximately <b>114.5 kilograms</b> of biodegradable wastes, <b>267.13 kilograms</b> of recyclable wastes, <b>36.7 kilograms</b> of special wastes, and <b>502.7 kilograms</b> of residual wastes were collected during the activity. The collected residual wastes were taken by the PGS Office Garbage Collector for proper disposal at the Sanitary Landfill Facility (SLF) located at Brgy. Sta. Catalina, City of Ilagan, Isabela. The recyclable wastes were temporarily stored the Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) located behind the ENR Office for further sorting and segregation. Additionally, the biodegradable wastes were placed in the compost heap for decomposition as soil enhancers/conditioners.</p>
<p>3. Activities undertaken at the Plastic Recycling Facility</p>		<p>All recyclable waste (plastic bottles) collected for this month was brought to the Plastic Recycling Facility. Removal of lids, rings, and labels as well as cleaning, washing, and drying was conducted. All bottles were properly sorted and piled in the facility while waiting for the installation of the electric transformer and post of the plastic recycling equipment/machines.</p>

<p><b>A. Processing and Issuance of Permits</b></p>	<p>The ENR Office as the implementing arm of the Provincial Government of Isabela in ENR concerns, is tasked to approve applications for small-scale mining, sand and gravel, quarry, guano, gemstone gathering and gratuitous permits and for industrial sand and gravel permits not exceeding five (5) hectares, under RA 7942 otherwise known as the Philippine Mining Act of 1995.</p>	<p>For the month of January, this office received Three (3) Commercial Sand and Gravel (CSAG) Permit Applications with corresponding administrative/ processing fees collected by the PTO amounting to Php 33,990.00.</p> <p>Site inspection and verification of the applied areas shall be conducted next month of February 2023.</p>

<p><b>B. Accreditation of Haulers</b></p>	<p>All haulers, traders, dealers and retailers of mineral/mineral products/by-products are required to be accredited by the Provincial Government through a Memorandum of Agreement with the Mines &amp; Geo-sciences Bureau Region 02</p>	<p>For this month, this office received and processed applications of, and issued Accreditation Permit, to One Hundred Ninety Five (195) haulers/ dealers/traders and retailers trading mineral products and by-products. Correspondingly, One Thousand Two Hundred Sixteen (1,216) accreditation stickers were issued for the conveyances and equipment registered.</p> <p>A total of 734,600.00 accreditation fees were remitted to PTO representing the permit application fees amounting to 491,400.00 and 243,200.00 for the stickers.</p>
<p><b>C. Site Verification and Inspection of Mining/Quarry Sites</b></p>	<p>The ENR Office is responsible in field verification and evaluation of quarry areas to determine compliance of permit holders and/or operators to environmental laws, rules and regulations. It is a part of the process prior to the endorsement of the application to PMRB for deliberation.</p>	<p>For this month, no site verification and inspection of applied areas was conducted.</p>
<p><b>D. Field Monitoring of Quarry Areas</b></p>		
<p>1. Regular field inspection and monitoring</p>	<p>This activity is in line with the implementation of Provincial Ordinance No. 5, series of 2014, to effectively regulate the utilization and monitor extraction activities, ensuring all necessary environmental measures are implemented in the quarry areas.</p>	<p>For this month, compliance checking of Accreditation Permit was conducted province-wide by the ISEP-TF Operative members, together with the extraction measures such as extraction in the main river bed, no screening of materials in the extraction site policy and pre-payment of quarry taxes and fees.</p> <p>Also, personnel of this Office specifically conducted said activities at the Municipalities of San Agustin, Jones, Sta. Maria, Cabagan, and San Pablo, Isabela. Majority of quarry areas in San Agustin and Jones has no operations, while a few in the Municipalities of Sta. Maria, Cabagan, and San Pablo already have operations during the visit. Nevertheless, flagged down vehicles transporting sand and gravel materials have already secured Accreditation Permit. Various haulers were also reminded of the renewal, as a result fifteen haulers immediately secured their Accreditation Permits.</p>
<p>2. Monitoring of extraction activities</p>	<p>Also, monitoring reports on extraction of sand and gravel and other quarry resources shall serve as basis for the collection of taxes and other related fees by the Provincial Treasurer's Office.</p>	<p>For the month of January, forty-eight (48) quarry areas have been monitored with extraction activities in the province with a total of 55,047.00 cu.m. of sand and gravel and other quarry resources extracted. This represents 1,760.00 Earth, 52,155.00 Mixed, and 1,132.00 Boulders; and with gross value amounting to Php 1,940,485.00 fees and taxes.</p> <p>Reports on extractions were accompanied by daily field monitoring reports and delivery receipts.</p> <p>Also, based on record, a total of Php 1,664,975.00 gross value of fees and taxes was remitted to PTO this month as prepayment to 46,005.00 cu.m. of Boulders and Mixed gravel materials.</p> <p>Post-payment was also remitted for the monitored aggregates with volume totalling to 7,620.00 cu.m. corresponding to Php 295,430.00 taxes and fees.</p>
