Implementation of forest rehabilitation and other greening efforts such as but not limited to watershed rehabilitation, agroforestry/urban greening, riparian rehabilitation & development, mangrove & beach forests rehabilitation with the aim to reduce the causes of global warming and its effect to biodiversity; and protect communities from risks of hazards caused by natural calamities.

Riparian Rehabilitation & Development Project

- 1-km riparian was rehabilitated at Cabisera 07, City of Ilagan, Isabela in partnership with Barangay Local Government Unit. A total of 1,000 bamboo propagules (2x2 spacing at 2-strips) was planted by Barangay officials and other volunteers.
- 7-km riparian is currently being rehabilitated at Rang-ayan, City of Ilagan, Isabela in partnership with Barangay Local Government Unit. A total of 1,500 bamboo propagules was provided to the BLGU. As of September, a total of 500 bamboo propagules were planted (7mx7m spacing, single strip) by Barangay officials and other volunteers. Remaining propagules shall be planted by the same in October.
- 1-km riparian is was rehabilitated along different creeks of Quirino, Isabela in partnership with the Municipal Local Government Unit of Quirino. A total of 1,000 bamboo propagules was provided and planted (2x2m spacing at 2-strips) by MLGU personnel and other volunteers. As of September, a total of 500 bamboo propagules were planted (7mx7m spacing, single strip) by Barangay officials and other volunteers. Remaining propagules shall be planted by the same in October.

Agroforestry Project

- One hectare agroforestry project was implemented at Brgy. Linglingay, City of Ilagan, Isabela in partnership with Municipal Local Government Unit of Gamu. A total of 400 assorted fruit-tree and forest tree seedlings was planted by personnel from MLGU and diffent agencies
- Five-hectare agroforestry project was implemented at Brgy. Simanu, San Pablo, Isabela in partnership with DOLE-TUPAD beneficiaries. A total of 2,034 assorted fruit and forest tree seedlings was planted by the beneficiaries.
- Two-hectare agroforestry project is being implemented at Brgy. Villa Miguel, Quirino, Isabela in partnership with the Municipal Local Government Unit of Quirino. A total of 800 assorted fruit and forest tree seedlings was provided to the MLGU. As of reporting period 60% of the seedlings were already planted.
- Two-hectare agroforestry project is being implemented at Brgy. Carmencita, Delfin Albano, Isabela in partnership with the Municipal Local Government Unit of Delfin Albano. A total of 800 assorted fruit and forest tree seedlings was provided to the MLGU. As of reporting period 50% of the seedlings were already planted.

Watershed Rehabilitation Project

- Two-hectare watershed rehabilitation project is being implemented at Brgy. Villa Miguel, Quirino, Isabela in partnership with the Municipal Local Government Unit of Quirino. A total of 2,224 assorted fruit and forest tree seedlings was provided to the MLGU. As of reporting period 60% of the seedlings were already planted.

Inspection of Completed Dredging Project Proposed for Bamboo Planting		<p>This Office, through its personnel, conducted an inspection of the completed dredging projects located in the municipalities of Roxas, Quezon, Quirino, San Isidro, Cauayan City, Reina Mercedes, Luna and Cabagan, Isabela. The primary focus of this activity was to identify areas within the dredged sites suitable for bamboo planting activities.</p> <p>A total of 13 areas across these municipalities were inspected, covering an actual dredging length of 4,040 meters. It was observed that some portions of these areas are feasible for bamboo planting activities.</p>

4. 2-Day Skills Training on Waste to Product

The Environment and Natural Resources Office facilitated its 1st Gender and Development (GAD) Activity: 2-day Skills Training on Waste-to-Product, equipping participants with practical skills in waste management, recycling, and upcycling. This training aimed to foster community involvement and reinforce participants ability to implement sustainable practices in their respective municipalities.

September 17-18, 2024 (1st Batch) & September 19-20, 2024 (2nd Batch)-

The first batch of participants includes 44 representatives from the municipalities of Angadanan, Benito Soliven, Cabatuan, Cordon, Gamu, Luna, Naguilian, and Reina Mercedes, while the second batch comprises 32 representatives from Cauayan City and the municipalities of Jones, Mallig, Quezon, Ramon, San Agustin, and Sta. Maria. The following Resource Speakers discuss the following topics:

1. For. Celia N. Badua, SupEMS/Chief, EMD, officially opened the course with a briefing on the Ecological Solid Waste Management Act of 2000 (RA 9003), introducing the solid waste management initiatives and laws being implemented in the province.
2. Ms. Gina D. Ruiz, Community Development Assistant II, discussed a topic on converting biodegradable waste into organic fertilizers/soil enhancers, demonstrating simple techniques that can be implemented at the community level.
3. Engr. Alejo S. Lamsen, Cauayan City ENR Officer, shared the “WOW Cauayan” Recycling Program, highlighting sustainable practices to combat the impacts of climate change.
4. Ms. Conchita L. Palencia, President of Isabela Green Ladies Organization (IGLO), shared best practices in upcycling, and recycling from IGLO members in various municipalities. She emphasized the commercial potential of recycled products such as handy bags made from plastic caps, charcoal briquettes, and glass jars made from recycled glass bottles. Ms. Palencia also discussed marginal pricing strategies and market opportunities for these products.
5. Ms. Julie F. Madrid, Manager, showcased their “Waste to Gold” program. She stressed the importance of using organic fertilizers to reduce pollution and encouraged participants to support local farmers by joining their association.

For the hands-on-session:
-Batch 1 participated in a charcoal briquette-making workshop led by Ms. Gina D. Ruiz.
-Batch 2 engaged in upcycling used paper into decorative pots, guided by Engr. Alejo S. Lamsen.

The event concluded with the awarding of certificates and a closing program led by For. Celia N. Badua on behalf of the ENR Officer, For. Geronimo P. Cabaccan, Jr. She praised the participants for their active involvement and dedication, which contributed to the success of the training.

Site Verification and Inspection of Mining/Quarry Sites</p>	<p>The ENR Office is responsible in field verification and evaluation of quarry areas to determine compliance of permit holders and/or operators to environmental laws, rules and regulations. It is a part of the process prior to the endorsement of the application to PMRB for deliberation.</p>	<p>For this month, area inspection and verification was conducted for the Commercial Sand and Gravel (CSAG) Permit application of Engr. Joel L. Garcia, located at Barangay Antagan 2nd, Tumauni, Isabela. D. Field Monitoring of Quarry Areas

Regular field inspection and monitoring</p>	<p>This activity is in line with the implementation of Provincial Ordinance No. 5, series of 2014, to effectively regulate the utilization and monitor extraction activities, ensuring all necessary environmental measures are implemented in the quarry areas. Also, monitoring reports on extraction of sand and gravel and other quarry resources shall serve as basis for the collection of taxes and other related fees by the Provincial Treasurer's Office.</p>	<p>Simultaneous with the compliance checking of Accreditation Permit conducted by the ISEP-TF Operative members, personnel of this Office also have its regular field inspection and monitoring. Activities include inspection of random vehicles transporting sand and gravel materials, supervising assigned personnel in the quarry areas, monitoring implementation of extraction policies such as "No Prepayment, No Extraction", extraction in the main river bed, and no screening of materials in the extraction site policy.</p> <p>For this month, said activities were specifically conducted at the Municipalities of Cabagan, Delfin Albano, Gamu, Jones, Roxas, San Agustin, San Pablo, Sta. Maria, and Tumauini, Isabela.</p> <p>All flagged-down vehicles transporting sand and gravel materials have already secured their Accreditation Permits. On the other hand, haulers/operators who have exhausted their pre-payments were advised to pay their post payment and secure another pre-payment to avoid temporary stoppage of their operation.</p> <p>All personnel assigned in their respective quarry areas of assignment were present and were reminded to ensure that operators and haulers within their areas of assignments are compliant to extraction policies. While those with no operation due to high water level reported to the Office and assisted in various nursery activities.</p>
<p>2. Monitoring of extraction activities</p>		<p>For the month of September, forty-one (41) quarry areas have been monitored with extraction activities in the province with a total of 32,578.00 cu.m. of sand and gravel and other quarry resources extracted. This represents 23,520.00 cu.m. Mixed, and 9,058.00 cu.m. Boulders; and with gross value amounting to Php 1,321,390.00 fees and taxes.</p> <p>Reports on extractions were accompanied by daily field monitoring reports and delivery receipts.</p> <p>Also, based on record, a total of Php 10,725,289.70 gross value of fees and taxes was remitted to PTO this month as prepayment to 228,218.81 cu.m. of Boulders, G1/S1, Mixed gravel and Ordinary Earth materials.</p> <p>Post-payment was also remitted for the monitored aggregates with volume totalling to 2,830.00 cu.m. of boulders, and mixed gravel corresponding to Php 113,250.00 taxes and fees.</p>

<p>3. Investigation/Settlement of Quarry and Mining Related Complaints</p>		<p>September 24, 2024 - In response to an endorsed communication from the MGB R-02, personnel of this office conducted investigation and verification of an alleged illegal mining activity at Barangay San Manuel, Naguilian, Isabela.</p> <p>Activities undertaken include courtesy call with LGU Naguilian through the Municipal ENR Officer and Punong Barangay of San Manuel; site inspection and verification in the area complaint together with representatives of LGU and Barangay; and, gathering of necessary and related information and photo documentation.</p> <p>Recommendations: - Advice the land heirs/complainants and barangay officials to do the filling-up/closing of the pits/holes to avoid untoward incidents or continuation of illegal activity; - For the Municipal LGU to issue Cease and Desist Order or Stoppage Order if and when there is re-occurrence of said illegal activity; and - The concerned barangay to continue monitor the area until the pits/holes are closed.</p>

Attendance/ Participation re Invitaaion to Meetings/Dialogues and Request for Technical Assistance Related to Mineral Resources Management</p>		<p>September 4, 2024 - In response to the invitation of MGB R-02 and issued Travel Order, this Office led by the ENR Officer assisted personnel of MGB in the issuance of Cease and Desist Order to identified small-scale miners within the permitted area of Cordillera Exploration Co., Inc. located at Barangay Anonang, Cordon, Isabela. The team, led by the MGB, were composed of representatives from the PG Isabela, LGU Cordon, and DENR-CENRO San Isidro. Activities conducted were as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Initial briefing at the Muicipal ENR Office; - Courtesy call with the Municipal Mayor, Hon. Lynn Zuniega where the purpose of the visit was presented. She conveyed her approval and also expressed her concern to her constituents who relies on mining as their livelihood. She also shared that there are reports of extraction and operation of GSMC which the team, through the MGB, committed to validate the information after CDO issuance. - The team proceeded to Barangay Hall of Anonang. Out of the 15 recipients of the CDO, only 12 were confimed as residents of the barangay and only 1 was able to present himself. The rest of the CDO were received by the Barangay Secretary to be given to the individuals; - The team went the GSMC Processing Plant and conducted inspection. Together GSMC representative, Engr. Robert Carreon of MGB explained the process how the plant is operated which led them to conclude that the plant is not yet operating; although once in a while, a preventive maintenance is undertaken. And the GSMC expressed that they are open for area inspection to prove that there are no extraction activities within the compound.
