The Women Welfare Program is one of the regular programs of the PSWD which aims to promote the welfare of the disadvantaged women giving special attention to the prevention, eradication of exploitation of women in any forms as well as promotion of skills for employment and self-actualization

The Comprehensive Program for Persons with Disabilities aims to promote services to all types of PWDs and members of the self-help group of PWDs. The program focuses on areas of disability prevention, rehabilitation and equalization of opportunities

Proclamation No. 1157 declares December 3, 2006 and every year thereafter as “International Day of Persons with Disabilities in the Philippines”

The celebration aims to promote empowerment and help create real opportunities for people with disabilities. **The theme for this year is “United in action to rescue and achieve the Sustainable Development Goals for, with and by persons with disabilities”.**

In observance to the proclamation, a two-day celebration was conducted with 108 PWDs to listen to the lectures of the Teachers of the Isabela School for the Deaf Center (ISDC) and PHIC Manager, Alexander A. Arellano. All participants were provided with

One of the major accomplishments of the provincial government of Isabela in terms of services to persons with disabilities is the provision of five-day lunch meal to 40 students of the SPED center extension who did not qualify to the accommodation standards of the ISDC.

V. Family Welfare Program

This program is intended to assist socially disadvantaged families to develop their capability in defining needs and formulating solutions to bring about desired social changes.

The provincial government of Isabela through the office of the Provincial Social Welfare and Development is regularly conducting parent effectiveness/parenting responsibility trainings under the GAD Plan and Budget to service providers primarily to provide expansion of knowledge and skills of parents and caregivers in the barangays to respond to parental duties and responsibilities on the areas of early childhood development, behavior management of younger and older children, husband and wife relationship, home management and other challenges of parenting.

There were three (3) batches of Enriched Parent Effectiveness Service Training conducted this year. The 1st and 2nd batch training was conducted at The Hotel Sophia, Cauayan City, Isabela with WCPD Officers and Punong Barangay while the 3rd batch was held at Piazza Zicarelli with Women Leaders and IP Coordinators in the province.



The provincial government of Isabela through the office of the PSWDO celebrated the Family Week through a one-day training on parenting responsibility with 30 young parents of the provincial capitol as participants.

The five (5) topics discussed during the one-day training are the following:

1. Developing Self-Esteem
2. Dynamics of Filipino Family
3. Parenting Styles
4. Strengthening Husband-Wife Relationship
5. Keeping Child Safe from Abuse

The celebration of the Family Week was graced by the good PA Atty. Noel Lopez with his Inspirational message reiterating the importance of providing children with positive experiences to enhance their growth, development, and potentials and that as a parent we are also responsible to learn the dynamics of their generation. All participants during the celebration of Family Week were provided with grocery pack amounting to P 1,000.00 each.



VI. Crisis Intervention/Quick Response

Crisis Intervention or Quick Response is to provide a comprehensive and integrated program for the rescue, protection and provision of immediate financial, material, physical, psychological and legal services to individuals and families in crisis situation, including disaster victims.

The PSWDO is mandated to contribute to better and improved quality of life for the citizenry. Priority attention shall be given to the poor, vulnerable and marginalized sectors of the society, hence, it implements social welfare, social protection and anti-poverty programs, projects and services such as the assistance to individuals in Crisis Situation (AICS), among others.

VII. Supplementary Milk Feeding Program

Under Section 2 of the Philippine Constitution recognizes the vital role of the youth in nation building and shall promote and protect their physical, moral, spiritual, intellectual and total well-being in recognition of the demonstrated relationship between food and nutrition, and capacity of students to develop and learn.

In spite of the feeding program for children of the National Government, the Provincial Government of Isabela through the leadership of the Honorable Governor Rodolfo T. Albano insisted to also include milk feeding to help the young children attain the recommended value of calcium, protein and vitamins to make them strong, active and healthy so as not to affect their learning capacity.

The Program aims not only to improve help condition of children nutritionally but also to support livelihood project of local dairy farmers were milk feeding comes from.

VIII. Enhance Comprehensive Local Integration Program (ECLIP)

The Enhanced Comprehensive Local Integration Program or ECLIP is a program intended to address the legal status and security of former rebels and their economic, social, and psychological rehabilitation needs. It aims to provide financial and livelihood assistance, as well as other forms of support to FRs who decided to abandon armed struggle and return to the folds of the law.

- Profiling of 243 FRs for enrolment to ECLIP through data online system
- Provided Food Packs with Rice at 5 kilos per sack to 243 FRs
- Awarding of livelihood assistance from DILG to 9 FRs at P50,000.00 each
- Awarding of livelihood assistance from DSWD to 40 FRs at P5,000.00



IX. Indigenous Peoples Program

The program aims to promote all the rights of Indigenous Cultural Communities/Indigenous Peoples (ICCs/IPs) within the framework of national unity and development and all shall protect the rights of IPs to their ancestral domains to ensure their economic, social and cultural well-being and to recognize the inherent rights of ICCs/IPs.

The Provincial Government of Isabela (PGI) has been and continuously supporting the basic needs of IP families especially children. The PGI, in recognition of IPs inherent rights provided the following, to wit:

- Extended Family Food Packs to eleven (11) stranded IPs from Divilacan, Isabela
- Provided Education materials to IP school children at San Vicente, San Pablo, Isabela
- Distributed a total of 413 sacks of rice at 20 kilos each IP family in the following municipalities of the province:


