Women and Children Protection Center	Home Life Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none">To date, 17 residents were provided with temporary shelter and protective custody. Likewise, provision of well balance food and snacks based on the menu prepared by the Provincial Dietician/Nutritionist, toiletries, milk and diaper for resident's dependent and other essential needs were regularly accorded to the residents.House parents properly guided all the residents concerning their daily activities and by inculcating simple household chores and enhancing self-skills.Conducted urgent/monthly meeting with the residents to discuss issues/concerns as well as recognition of performer and character building for this month to motivate and boost moral values and self-esteem that serve as a foundation of ethical living and personal growth.As part of home life activities, the residents are given respective schedule in preparing the food and proper table setting with the guidance of the Cook and House parents.The House parents conducted monthly session on "Proper Dishwashing" to all residents as part of household learning.The House parents and Laundry Worker guided the children in proper washing of soiled clothes including hand sewing of ripped clothes.

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	Psycho-Social Care Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none">The Psychometrician, Ms. Allysa Mary Ballesteros conducted group dynamics: "Self-Portrait/The Real Me" to all residents. This aims to encourage residents to explore their inner and outer selves through art, help them reflect on their identity, strengths, and unique characteristics, and by expressing their thoughts, feelings, & emotions.To date, the Mental Health Professionals conducted two (2) sessions on Group Counseling among six (6) residents who																					

		<p>encountered anxiety and other manifestation of PTSD. This activity somehow provides support system, develop coping strategies & techniques, building confidence and self-esteem.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Psychologist, Ms. Alliana Dawn Salmos provided individual counseling to ten (10) residents to address mental health issues encountered such as anxiety and trauma, likewise in preparation for court appearance.
	Educational Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> There are fifteen (15) residents who are enrolled in formal education for CY 2024-2025 have provided with school allowances/fare, expenses for projects, school supplies, and other mandatory contributions. Out of eight (8) high school learners, five (5) of whom received academic awards (With Honors) while two have completed the requirements of Junior High School. Among six (6) elementary learners, three (3) are graduated with academic awards (With Honors) and the others learners likewise received recognition awards. The House parents regularly attended the classroom meeting in preparation for moving-up/recognition rites of learners and candidates for graduation both in elementary and secondary. All in-school/modular learners were guided by the House parents in complying school projects, answering modules including research work. The House parents assisted one (1) Senior learner (Modular) to undergo 4th quarter examination at the Isabela Sports Senior High School for completion of the requirements as Grade XI. The Center Head and House parents assisted all learners in attending Moving-up and Recognition Rites both in Elementary and Secondary. All children have participated in Project Wellness Activity conducted by the ISU Ilagan Campus female personnel. This activity aims to enhance literacy of every resident.
	Health Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Provision of free dental services like tooth extraction and medicines have provided to seven residents at the GFNDM Hospital. Whereas, six (6) residents have undergone dental filling and one (1) client for cleaning in a private clinic. One (1) client was confined in the Infirmary Room due to fever & colds with provision of free medicines with closed monitoring of In-house Nurse. Provision of vitamins, weekly physical check-up and monthly monitoring of weight and height to all residents was regularly conducted by the In-house Nurse for purpose of assessing growth pattern of children and adolescent as well as tracking of progress of weight loss or gain. The In-House Nurse continuously provided health promotion and awareness session among the residents through discussion on "First Aid Medication and their Uses".
	Legal Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> This month, there are eight (8) minor clients who were assisted and escorted for arraignment, cross examination and other court proceedings at the RTC Branch 16, 18, 19, & 23. Prosecutor's witness Psychologist Dr. Kathreen Joson was able to testify on behalf of the client's psychological assessment as

Consultation and discussion on the result of Motion for Reconsideration filed by Prosecutor [REDACTED] on behalf of the client minor at the Regional Trial Court Br. 24.
	Spiritual Services and Values Inculcation	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Spiritual enhancement activity for all residents & staff through Recollection with Sr. Mary Michaela A. Lumoc, FLDP and Station of the Cross within the WCPC vicinity, television viewing on the life and sacrifices of Jesus were observed this Holy Week. All residents were guided in daily life experienced through group prayer and devotion every morning and evening regardless of their religion. Also, they are motivated to lead the prayer before and after mealtime as part of spiritual teaching. With a proper coordination and by following the Center Rules, other religious sector was accommodated in the Center to conduct spiritual growth among the residents. Values inculcation towards residents was accorded by shaping their character, by instilling respect and to become responsible individual.
	Recreational, Sports and other Socio-Cultural Activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Residents were given privilege for free play at the Center ground to explore and express themselves without structured rules likewise to enhance motor skills, social interaction by building close relationships with co-residents. By utilizing board games like puzzle, sequence, scrabble, sungka and others, somehow improved creativity/imagination, decision making, resourcefulness, cognitive, and by building confidence and independence. All residents are given opportunity to have Zumba dance to enhance social and physical skills.
	Economic/ Livelihood Skills and Development	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mastery of skills learned in basic sewing by using the manual sewing machine, doughnut, and rug making were continually provided to residents during allotted time for livelihood activity. Prepared and submitted project proposal charged to Gender and Development (GAD) Fund for skills training both for residents & mother/guardian and capital assistance for mother/guardian who will attend the said training.
	Case Management	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Home visitation to clients' family and likewise convened case conference at the MSWDO Cordon, Isabela relative to the forthcoming reintegration of two (2) clients with their respective family. Also, follow-up the Parenting Capability Assessment Report (PCAR) as basis of the Center to formally discharge and or possible extension of clients to stay for continuation of psychosocial intervention. Regular updating of case folder of 17 admitted children with Case Study Report, Intervention Plan, Running Notes,

		<p>Monthly Anecdotal Report, Medical Record, Daily Observation Logbook, and other records are continually updated and properly filed.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identification of Monthly Performer and Character Building for the month of April among the residents for recognition and by motivating others to improve their performance. A simple token was given to identified performer as symbol of reward. • Social Workers/Case Managers regularly attended court proceedings and other legal activities of every resident. • Continuous collaboration with the stakeholders: PNP/WCPD, Teachers/Principal, Prosecutors, and C/MSWDO & Court Social Workers for case management update. • Legal consultation was made with Atty. Karla Louise Agbayani, Assistance Provincial Legal Officer relative to client's filed criminal complaint and other legal issues & concerns. • Daily turned-over of the House Parents pertaining to feedbacking on the day-to-day observations to residents for immediate action with the presence of other members of rehabilitation team.
