2022 ANNUAL ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT

Brief Background:

The **SAN MARIANO COMMUNITY HOSPITAL** formerly known as San Mariano Medicare & Community Hospital was established in 1970's situated at Zone 01, San Mariano, Isabela. It was then a primary health facility owned and managed by the national government. But eventually, it was devolved and turned over to the Provincial Government of Isabela in 1990's. Due to the continuous influx of patients and the desire to provide them quality health services, a new hospital building was proposed through the initiative of the local officials of the province with the help of the Department of Health through its HFEP Program. The newly constructed building is now located at Sta. Filomena, San Mariano, Isabela adjacent to the Municipal Health Office with a lot area of 5,000 square meters and 1,296 square meters floor area. It was inaugurated on August 28, 2013 and became fully operational on September 28, 2013.

Mandate of the Facility


To facilitate the delivery of quality Health services to the constituents of Isabela especially to the less fortunate ones.

VISION : A 25-Bed, Level I Center of Quality, that offers an accessible, affordable and quality health services to the people of San Mariano and nearby towns.

MISSION: To promptly provide Medical, Pediatric, Surgical, Obstetrical/Gynecological, Diagnostic, Radiological and Pharmacological service in a center of safety and quality that is affordable, if not free, through national and local health financing programs.

SMCH has an authorized 10 bed capacity but with actual implementing bed of 28, thus, an increase of BOR at 280.25%.

This facility was accorded a Level 1 License to Operate and Level 2 Laboratory by the DOH Licensing Division. A Certificate of Accreditation as Level 1 hospital was also granted by the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation.











I. ANTI DENGUE CAMPAIGN:

“TODAS DENGUE, TODO NA ‘TO IKASIYAM NA KAGAT” CLEAN-UP ACTIVITY

Dengue cases in the Philippines is tremendously increasing with a total reported cases of around 34,000 from January to June 2022 according to WHO. Given this scenario, an Executive Order No. 07-2022 Series of 2022 was issued by our beloved Governor, Hon. Rodolfo T. Albano, III, enjoining all government and non- government offices in the province for the conduct of “*TODAS DENGUE, TODO NA ‘TO IKASIYAM NA KAGAT*” clean-up activity on June 25, 2022. It is a massive clean-up activity to eliminate mosquito breeding sites and stop the spread of Dengue fever and other mosquito-borne diseases.

As early as 7:00 in the morning of June 25, 2022, SMCH employees spearheaded by Dr. Jesus C. Salvador, Chief of Hospital, joined the activity by cleaning the whole hospital. The activity lasted for 3 hours, wherein, all staff initially cleaned their respective offices and assigned areas, followed by cleaning of the hospital surroundings. Staff on duties also participated in the activity by giving health teachings to patients and significant others on the observance of 5 S Kontra Dengue Strategy.

Some of the boys went to the roof and cleaned the gutters and removed the leaves that clogged it, considering that this is one of the most common breeding sites of mosquitos. While others cut down the tall grasses near the laboratory building. Girls swept the fallen leaves outside the hospital premises and others helped the boys in weeding. After cleaning, all were gathered in the pantry and ate their snacks before going home.



Del Pilar, San Mariano, Isabela.

All in all, there were 50 bags of blood extracted from screened donors.

But finally, after almost 2 years, cases of Covid 19 disease lowered down, thus face to face classes was approved.




